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# Hawaii APSR 2024 Data Booklet

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### Overview

awaii's FFY 2024 APSR Data Booklet is an integral part of the FFY 2024 ASPR. The figures contained in this booklet are referenced throughout the FFY 2024 APSR and provide detail and graphic representation of the relevant data. Although, there may be occasional clarifying notes following the figures in this booklet, it is recommended that the data in this booklet be reviewed along with the accompanying narrative in the FFY 2024 APSR for proper context, and a more complete understanding.

The data contained in this booklet was gathered from internal Department of Human Services (DHS) sources, community stakeholders, partners, and contracted providers, then compiled and presented in these figures to help inform the reader.

The Child Welfare Services database, Child Protective Services System (CPSS), was the source of much of the data. Within CPSS, data does not remain static; rather it will experience some temporal flux due to the addition or modification of data following the extraction of data for a report. The data extracted farther from the period being reported is usually more stable than data extracted closer to the report period. Please consider this as you encounter discrepancies between the data in this booklet and other historic data reports.

Extraction and reporting protocols:

- Hawaii's State Fiscal Year (SFY) begins on July 1 and runs through June 30 of the following year.
- Child's age is calculated as of: the last day of the report period if the child is still in care or receiving the service being reported; the date of exit from foster; or at the date of a specific event, *e.g.*, adoption or award of legal guardianship, depending on the information being reported.
- Child's age is reported in years, as an integer, *e.g.*, age 0 includes birth to the day before the child's first birthday, age 1 includes the first birthday to the day before the child's second birthday. [0.0 through 0.99 = 0, 1.0 through 1.99 = 1]
- Counts of children in care and recipients of services/benefits:
  - Monthly average, or more accurately average monthly, data looks at the total count for each month and then combines and averages the total over 12 months. This provides a more realistic measure/approach to service needs and capacity. Individuals are unduplicated within a month but might be duplicated in the total of all months.
  - Annual count, used in reporting per SFY, is an unduplicated count of all who received that service during the stated year.

# **Factors Precipitating Incident for Confirmed Victims**

The Factors Precipitating Incident are conditions that were identified as contributing to the abuse or neglect of the child. If more than one factor applies, all factors (up to a maximum of six) have been included in this table. Therefore, the total count of factors may exceed the total number of child victims. The Percent figure is based on the total number of confirmed victims.

• The "Children" column indicates the number of children for whom this factor was reported.

• The "Percent" column percentage is based on the total number of confirmed victims, and the number of victims with this factor (children for factor/total number of children =%).

• Since more than one factor may be indicated per victim, the children and percentages will add up to more than the total number of confirmed victims and more than 100%.

#### Total Reported and Confirmed Intakes

An intake is a report of a child abuse or neglect incident that have been accepted for investigation and a determination of the abuse/neglect have been made. An intake usually refers to a family unit and may involve the possible maltreatment of more than one child. A confirmed intake is one where at least one child in the intake had at least one abuse type confirmed or substantiated. A separate, unrelated incident may result in another intake for the same family or child.

# **CFSR** Items

This report presents the findings from the Hawaii Child Welfare Continuous Quality Improvement (HCWCQI) Project's Case Reviews for the State of Hawaii, Department of Human Services (DHS), Child Welfare Services (CWS). The review is designed to help Hawaii:

- ensure that CWS practice conforms to federal child welfare requirements.
- determine what is actually happening to children and families that are engaged with CWS.
- enhance Hawaii's capacity to help children and families achieve positive outcomes.

The case reviewers thoroughly read the case files including the CPSS database and interviewed caseworkers, supervisors, parents, children, resource caregivers, service providers, and/or Guardians ad Litem. HCWCQI staff assured the results' quality, validity, and accuracy during the on-site review through at least two levels of quality assurance.

Due to COVID -19, from April 1, 2020 to June 30, 2022, the case reviews were conducted by a single trained reviewer from the HCWCQI team. A portion of cases was selected for a third level of QA review by a federal Administration for Children & Families (*ACF*) representative.

A period under review (PUR) was identified for each review beginning January 1, April 1, July 1, or October 1 of the prior year and ending on the first day that the case is reviewed.

Ninety-five (95) cases were randomly selected from both foster care and in-home cases in CPSS. Between 10 and 17 cases were selected from each CWS Section. The neighbor island sections included cases from their corresponding Voluntary Case Management (VCM) units. Oahu VCM held a separate review with six cases. To be eligible for review, an in-home case must have been opened for at least 45 consecutive days during the period under review, and a foster care case must have a child in foster care for at least 24 hours during the sampling period. For foster care cases, reviewers focused on one target child. For in-home child welfare cases, reviews focused on all children in the home.
