I. Call to Order at 10:15am

IV. State Rehabilitation Council Verbal Reports

- 1. National Coalition of State Rehabilitation Councils, Inc. (NCSRC) and Councils of State Administrators of Vocational Rehabilitation (CSAVR) Spring Conference Attendees' Reports
 - Evan Nakatsuka

Chair E. Nakatsuka discussed the conference he attended in April. Changes at Federal level with funding, discussion of DVR waitlist might need to come back if there are budget cuts, collaboration with other workforce development programs, SRC work with DVR on topic of order of selection, importance of VR programs to spend down current fiscal year funding, advocate with legislatures that VR is an important program to keep funded. Chair E. Nataksuka asked if anyone had any questions. H. Lesser encouraged all council members who are around next spring to go and attend these conferences, visit congressman, congresswoman, they need to hear from the SRC, funding is in jeopardy, advocate with legislatures. Fall conference end of October, early November in California, spring conference in Washington DC.

V. Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) Data Report VRA Lea Dias L. Dias introduced herself and thanked all the members of the SRC.

3. Status of Competitive Integrative Employment (CIE) Detail

In Quarter 3 some jobs included Computer Hardware Engineers, Managers, Mental Health Counselors, Financial Managers, Waiters and Waitresses, Automotive Service Technicians and Mechanics, Stock Clerks, Office and Administrative Support Workers, Environmental Engineering Technicians, Postsecondary Teachers, Chefs and Head Cooks, Combined Food Preparation and Serving Workers, Postsecondary Teachers, and Security Guards. Wages ranged from \$11.00-\$48.08/hour. Average Earnings for Quarter 3: \$25.49/hour and 35.78 hours/week.

5. Status of Impartial Hearings

There were no requests for review to pursue impartial fair hearings this quarter.

H. Lesser expressed concern around Pre-ETS, and asked L. Dias if all the money is being spent so we don't need to send back any money. L. Dias stated we are hopefully on track to spend the budget, and we're watching it very carefully and reviewing it a couple times a month. I can explain more in my verbal report.

VI. Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR) Verbal Updates VRA Lea Dias
L. Dias discussed executive orders which are instructions to the president's administration on areas he wishes to change. The US Dept of Education is the smallest of all the departments and 50% of those have been laid off. Discussion about moving DVR to a different Department: A. Keep DVR in DOE, B. Move DVR to Dept of Labor C. Move DVR to Dept of Human Services.

Chair E. Nakatsuka called for a break at 11:12am. Asked to resume at 11:22am.

The meeting resumed at 11:29am.

L. Dias stated we're on track to meet our 15% spending. Right now we have actual expenditures of \$588,672 and another projected \$1.36 million tied up in purchase orders that haven't been paid out yet but are in the queue. We need to hit \$2,524,000 so we are very close to spending it all. A lot of states are going into order of selection or waitlist. L. Dias stated that we have no plans to go in an order of selection, and if we needed to we'd be coming to the SRC and public hearings before it could happen. L. Dias explained there are two reasons why agencies go into order of selection. Either you don't have enough staff or you don't have enough money to cover all of the vacancies and still continue to provide services to clients.

C. Taylor asked if we have a partnership with the University for certificate programs and collaboration for VR clients. L. Dias stated that we currently don't have any kind of program like that right now, but it sounds like it would be a good idea. Legislative session, DVR wrote testimony for 30 different bills related to individuals with disabilities, testified for braille literacy in DOE.
