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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Implemented in 5 areas known as demonstration sites and it proved to be very successful in past 30 years. <p>8 CORE STRATEGIES (Implementation)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● JDAI is based on interconnected core strategies and approaches to promote smarter, more equitable, more efficient, and more effective systems that help meet the needs of young people and their families. Sites core strategies include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Promoting collaboration between juvenile court officials, probation agencies, prosecutors, defense attorneys, schools, community organizations and advocates. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Are we asking people in the community that represent the kids in the detention center ○ Using rigorous data collection and analysis to guide decision making. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Collect accurate data ➤ Eliminate disparities ○ Utilizing objective admissions criteria and screening instruments to replace subjective decision-making processes. 			

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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ Should we be using a risk assessment instrument making sure it doesn't make the disparities bigger ○ Implementing new or expanded community-based alternatives to locked facilities — such as day and evening reporting centers, home confinement and shelter care; ○ Instituting case processing reforms to expedite the flow of cases through the system; ○ Reducing the number of youths detained for probation rule violations or failing to appear in court, and the number held in detention awaiting transfer to a residential facility; ○ Improving racial and ethnic equity by examining data to identify policies and practices that may disadvantage youth of color at various stages of the process, and pursuing strategies to ensure a more level playing field for youth regardless of race or
