Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women

Women, Race, Climate Change, and Resilience in Hawai'i

Women of color represent the majority of Hawai'i residents, though few framings in research, policy, and popular culture address the particular sets of impacts and outcomes that disproportionately affect women of color as a class. Across race and ethnicity, women of color are most likely to be impacted by structures that generate wealth inequality, health disparities, housing instability, and environmental degradation here and around the world. As global climate change exacerbates social inequality and introduces new crises, we know that the human impacts will land on women of color most heavily. As Hawai'i turns its political and cultural attention to mitigating climate change in our islands, there is a unique opportunity to center the experiences of those most disadvantaged by social and political structures. By centering the experiences and voices of women of color we have an opportunity to build mitigation strategies that do not merely solutionize a problem at the level of mere survival, but create opportunities to redirect resources to ensure our entire community thrives.

The goal of this engagement is to convene an affinity group of women of color leaders (inclusive of but not limited to Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander, Filipino, those of African, Asian, Latinx, Middle Eastern, Native American and Indigenous descent) who work at touch points in providing public services, advocacy, and education in their respective communities. One key goal is to enhance the diversity and inclusion of women of color in opportunities for women's advocacy in Hawai'i on a broader scale, including participation in the Women's Coalition of Hawai'i, engagement in legislative processes, and contributing to understanding the true scope of the status of women in Hawai'i through engaging in community-based participatory research and grassroots level assessments. This group will provide a forum for women of color in the nonprofit and public sector to share resources, request and share advice, and to network. The group will be established as a place to build skills, share tools and ideas across sectors, with the ultimate goal of effecting change in workplaces, social circles, and personal interactions by supporting the leadership of women of color in Hawai'i.

Needs sensing engagements

We held two community needs sensing engagements inviting women of color to moderated talk story sessions in November 2019 and January 2020. While the meetings themselves were open-ended and advertised as support nights for women of color to meet, network, and learn about each other, there were a set of recurring themes that emerged:

- Women of color experienced unique and persistent challenges in the workplace
- Women of color identified clear structures and cultural attitudes that impeded their ability to access resources of support

- Women of color build and maintain alternative means of support and engagement through building and nurturing affective networks in their communities
- Women of color in Hawai'i have strong connections to and seek resilience in the natural environment

Among the many issues raised in these needs sensing engagements, women identified economic, health, and spiritual issues as of the utmost concern and expressed a sense of agency but a lack of access to resources needed to address these disparities.

Through these facilitated conversations, one request that emerged was support in developing a community-based participatory research project on the status of women of color that could support multiple mobilizations for coalition building through providing ongoing opportunities for women to meet with a defined purpose and set of outcomes, including training in developing strategies and frameworks for support and relationship building across sectors.

The result of those conversations is this proposed community-based participatory research project investigating the status of women of color in the midst of the climate crisis in Hawai'i.

Research questions

Though there are reports on specific economic aspects of women's lives in Hawai'i, there has been no pointed investigation on how social and economic structures array inequality for many communities of women invisibilized in terms of ethnicity, race, generation, and geography. The data that are most accessible are extractive data, looking at employment rates, earning potential, and wage gaps that flatten women's experience into quanta and spur policy interventions that push quantitative increments of change, rather than changes in culture and community values. When addressed, the conditions of indigenous women or immigrant women are presented in separate and distinct etiologies or subsumed in discussions of women across all points of difference. Evaluating the status of women in Hawai'i asks us to measure aspects of social value, however, focusing on women of color whose identities, experiences, and expertise have been overlooked also provides an opportunity to re-envision what a measurement of women's status could look like beyond numbers.

The proposed study will seek to answer the following research questions:

- What specific ways do human impacts of climate change (economic, social, environmental, spiritual) impinge on the lives of women of color and their communities in Hawai'i?
- What are the most pressing needs for policy and social intervention for women of color as climate change re-orders social life in Hawai'i and beyond?
- What resilience strategies do women of color and their communities already employ in managing social and economic disparity that can be supported on larger scales in Hawai'i to mitigate climate impacts for all?

Training goals

A crucial component of this study is equipping women of color community leaders to engage in qualitative research in response to the stated research questions in a way that increases their capacity and strengthens their networks of resources. Framing the study as a community-based participatory research project not only ensures the quality of data that can be generated from marginalized communities across the state, but also ensures that the results of the study will be meaningful and relevant to a wide coalition of women. This project will leave participants better provisioned to move from observation to analysis to articulable priorities that can empower them to shape policy or cultural interventions.

Women who participate will be supported in developing

- Inside-outside community approaches to research— accessing existing research and connecting to program work (research conducted by the census, other government agencies, and scholars)
- Qualitative research methods—training in how to prepare and conduct conversational interviews for data gathering purposes, data analysis, methods for reporting back to communities and other constituencies

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


