**REPORT TO THE THIRTY-SECOND HAWAII STATE LEGISLATURE 2023**

**IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 346-51.5,  
HAWAII REVISED STATUTES, ON THE TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR  
NEEDY FAMILIES & TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR OTHER NEEDY  
FAMILIES PROGRAMS**

Benefit, Employment and Support Services Division  
March 2023**

Section 346-51.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), requires the Department of Human Services (DHS) to prepare a report on the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and Temporary Assistance for Other Needy Families (TAONF) programs that include:

- 1) A plan for expenditure of TANF funds to include, a) details how the funds received under TANF shall be expended; and b) descriptions of the desired outcomes from the expenditure of the funds; and
- 2) A report about a) the continuing strategic planning process, with the assistance of the Financial Assistance Advisory Council, to involve the community in planning for the future use of TANF funds and setting annual goals and outcomes for existing and new programs receiving TANF; b) on the effectiveness and level of success in reaching the desired outcomes from the previous two fiscal years using TANF funds; and c) on any funds received and expended supplemental to the TANF block grant, the purposes for which the funds were expended; and outcomes achieved.

### **PROGRAM OVERVIEW**

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) is a federal block grant program. The TANF program requirements are per the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, Public Law 104-193 (“Welfare Reform”). Before Welfare Reform, the Aid for Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program did not distinguish between citizen or non-citizen or single or two-parent households. However, the 1996 Welfare Reform limited TANF eligibility to US citizens, single or two-parent households with dependent minor children, and certain single-parent immigrant households.

Recognizing the diversity of Hawaii's families and consistent with Article IX, Section 3 of the State Constitution, and in response to federal Welfare Reform, the Legislature created the state-funded Temporary Assistance for Other Needy Families (TAONF) program to continue to provide financial assistance to families that were eligible for benefits through AFDC but would no longer be eligible through TANF due to their citizenship status. The state-funded TAONF program rules mirror TANF program rules and provide the same benefits and services to Hawaii's needy families with children, including mixed citizenship or non-citizenship single and two-parent households. Importantly, the general fund appropriation for TAONF also serves as a significant portion of the State's Maintenance of Effort (MOE) required to receive the TANF block grant.

The TANF and TAONF programs are time-limited cash assistance programs for families with dependent children under 18 years old. Families may receive up to sixty (60) months of cash assistance benefits in their lifetime through the TANF or TAONF program. Family participation in the TANF or TAONF program depends on the household composition. When all household members are US citizens, the family is eligible for federal-funded financial benefits under TANF.

Families with at least one non-citizen family member are eligible for state-funded benefits under TAONF. Other than the funding sources, the TANF and TAONF programs are identical.

These programs provide temporary financial relief to families and stabilize their current financial situation through participation in the First-To-Work (FTW) program. TANF and TAONF recipient families must participate in the FTW program, which provides education and vocational training support, job readiness training, job search assistance, employment placement services, case management, counseling services, and other supportive services so families may obtain and maintain employment. In addition, families may receive child care subsidies, assistance with transportation costs, and work- and education-related expenses while engaged in the FTW program to ensure their success.

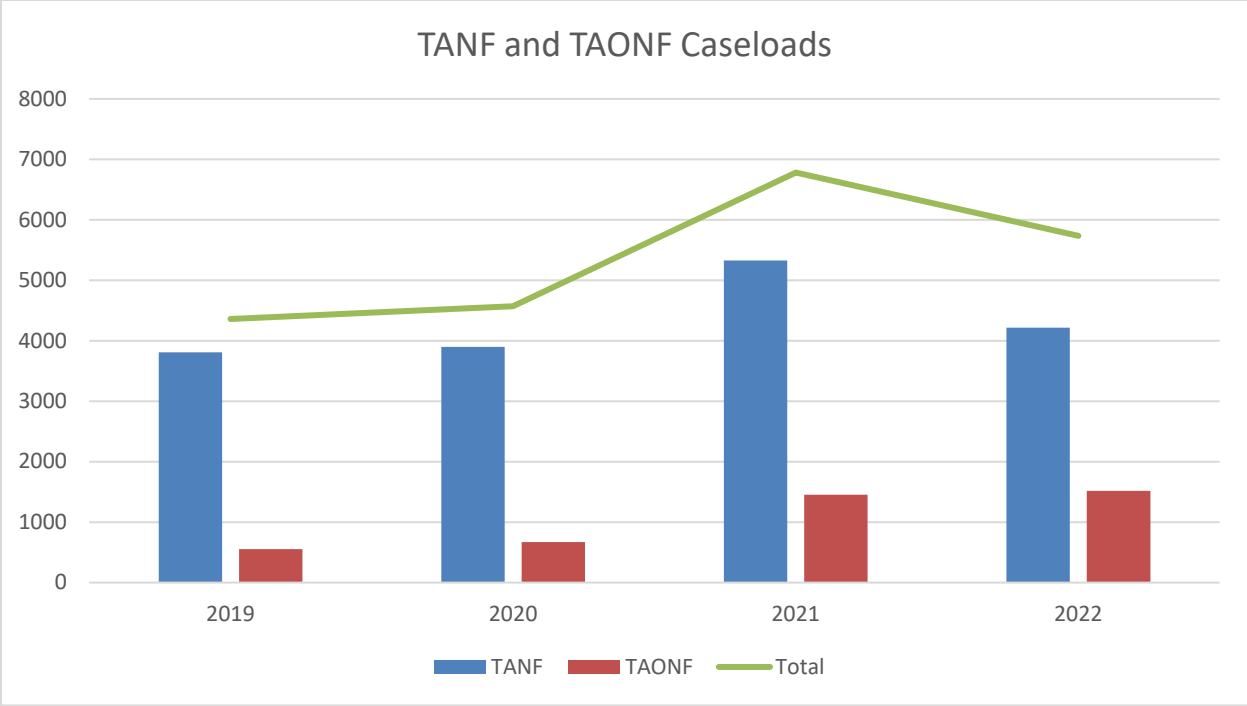
The TANF and TAONF programs provide families with monthly cash benefits that can be expended for food, clothing, shelter, and other essentials. To qualify for this assistance, a family must include a child under 18 and earn a total gross income under 185% of the 2006 Federal Poverty level. This means the monthly gross income must be less than \$2,941 for a household of three persons, and the net income must be under \$610 if the household includes an employable adult. In addition, for households where all adults are disabled, care is required for a disabled household member, or there is a child younger than six months of age, then the net income must be under \$763 per month. Effective April 18, 2013, DHS disregards assets under the TANF and TAONF programs.

### **TRANSITION FROM COVID-19**

The Governor's Sixth Supplementary Emergency Proclamation for COVID-19 signed on April 25, 2020, suspended sections 346-29 and 346-261, HRS, which established the TANF/TAONF application requirements and the mandatory FTW program for recipients. The suspension of sections 346-53 and 346-261, HRS, ended effective August 7, 2021. However, in fiscal year 2022, the TANF/TAONF programs continued to align its waived eligibility interview requirement with the waivers approved for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). The requirement to complete an eligibility interview was resumed for TANF/TAONF applicants but was waived for recipients due for their annual eligibility redetermination. Other waivers implemented in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, such as telephonic signatures, waived upfront work program requirements, and postponed eligibility reviews, ended in June 2022 for the TANF/TAONF programs.

### **CASELOAD OVERVIEW**

The average monthly caseloads for TANF and TAONF in SFY 2022 were 4,217 and 924, respectively, for a combined average monthly total of 5,141 cases, about a 24.19% decrease from SFY 2021; however, the caseload remains 17.67% higher than SFY 2019 or pre-pandemic (4,369 total monthly average).

**II. TANF STRATEGIC PLANNING AND LEVEL OF SUCCESS**

**A. The Financial Assistance Advisory Council (FAAC)**

No meetings were conducted during fiscal year 2022.

**B. TANF Measures of Effectiveness and Level of Success in Reaching Outcomes**

The outcomes for the TANF Program, as reflected in the State Budget, are as follows:

**1. Percentage of Households Determined Eligible for TANF Assistance**

FY 2022 Planned = 15%

FY 2022 Actual = 27% average per month

FY 2023 Planned = 25%

**2. Percentage of TANF Recipients in Work Program Exiting Due to Employment**

FY 2022 Planned = 15% average per month

FY 2022 Actual = 17% average per month

FY 2023 Planned = 17%

For SFY 2022, the average wage of employed work program participants was \$13.71/hour. Based on 30 employment hours per week, the estimated gross earnings of \$1,782 per month would allow a family of three to be eligible for TANF benefits.

**3. Percentage of TANF Recipients Who Obtained Employment**

FY 2022 Planned = 15% (average per month)

FY 2022 Actual = 21% of recipient families (average per month)

FY 2023 Planned = 21% (average per month)

**4. Percentage of TANF Households Exited Due to Earnings**

FY 2022 Planned = 14%

FY 2022 Actual = Of the total families who exited TANF each month, 17% of the families exited due to earned income (average per month)

FY 2023 Planned = 17%

**5. Supporting Employment Empowerment (SEE) Hawaii Work Program**

The DHS implemented the SEE Program in 2006 to provide on-the-job training and employment opportunities with private sector employers for First-To-Work (FTW) Program participants that may have little or no work experience or basic work skills. Participants employed through the SEE Program may work a minimum of 24 hours per week for up to six (6) months.

Participating employers pay SEE employees' (FTW participants) wages and benefits. The State reimburses the employers 100% of the State's hourly minimum wage. For each additional \$1.00 per hour paid to the SEE employee, the State reimburses the employer \$0.50. The maximum hourly rate paid to the employee that may be subsidized is \$20.00, and the employee may work no more than 40 hours/per week. Employers also are reimbursed 14% of the subsidized wages to cover the cost of training and other employment-related costs and overhead expenses. Additionally, the State provides SEE employees supportive service payments such as transportation and child care assistance.

a) *Participants Employed Through the SEE Program:*

SFY 2021 = 237 employed (unduplicated) FTW participants

SFY 2022 = 147 employed (unduplicated) FTW participants

b) *Average Work Hours and Wage:*

SFY 2021 = Average of 40 hours/week for an average wage of \$13.39/hour

SFY 2022 = Average of 36 hours/week for an average wage of \$14.60/hour

c) *Transitioned from Subsidized to Unsubsidized Employment:*

SFY 2021 = 76% transitioned from SEE to unsubsidized employment

SFY 2022 = 33% transitioned from SEE to unsubsidized employment

d) *Businesses Participated in the SEE Program:*

SFY 2021 = 129 SEE employers

SFY 2022 = 244 SEE employers



## 6. Work Participation Rates

The Federal government mandates that states meet two work participation rates as a condition of receiving and expending TANF Federal Block Grant and State Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirements.

- a) *All-Family Participation Rate of 50%:* Of all TANF recipient cases that have at least one work-eligible individual who is complying with their federally mandated work activities.

The 50% compliance rate for the All-Family Rate is the federal baseline before factoring in the caseload reduction credit, the credit to the State for declining assistance caseloads.<sup>1</sup> Hawaii's Caseload Reduction Credit for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2022 is estimated at 56.9%. The adjusted All-Family work participation requirement to be met is zero percent (50% - 56.9% = 0%).<sup>1</sup>

As of December 2022, 13.18% of mandatory households met the work participation requirements for FFY 2022. Therefore, Hawaii exceeds the required participation, 13.18%, compared to zero percent.

### *Mandatory Households Meeting All-Family Work Participation Requirements*

FFY 2022 Planned = 15%

Actual = 13.18% (prior to the application of the Caseload Reduction Credit)

FFY 2023 Planned = 15% (prior to the application of the Caseload Reduction Credit)

- b) *Two-Parent Participation Rate of 90%:* Of all TANF recipient cases with two work-eligible parents complying with their federally mandated work activities.

The 90% compliance rate for the Two-Parent Rate is the federal baseline before factoring in the Caseload Reduction Credit. The same estimated Caseload Reduction Credit for FFY 2022 of 56.9% can be applied. The adjusted Two-Parent Participation Rate to be met is 33.1% (90% - 56.9% = 33.1%).

<sup>1</sup> Pursuant to Section 407(b)(3) of the Social Security Act (the Act), the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Administration for Children and Families (ACF), reduces a state's required participation rate for a Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) when the number of percentage points that the average monthly number of families receiving assistance during the year immediately preceding the current fiscal year is less than the average monthly number of families that received assistance during the comparison year (FFY 1995). The statute prohibits this reduction from including any caseload declines due to requirements of Federal law or due to differences in state eligibility criteria. The reduction in the participation rate is referred to as the Caseload Reduction Credit.

As of December 2022, 18.4% of mandatory two-parent met the work participation requirements for FFY 2021. Therefore, Hawaii did not meet the required two-parent participation rate, 18.4%, compared to 33.1%.

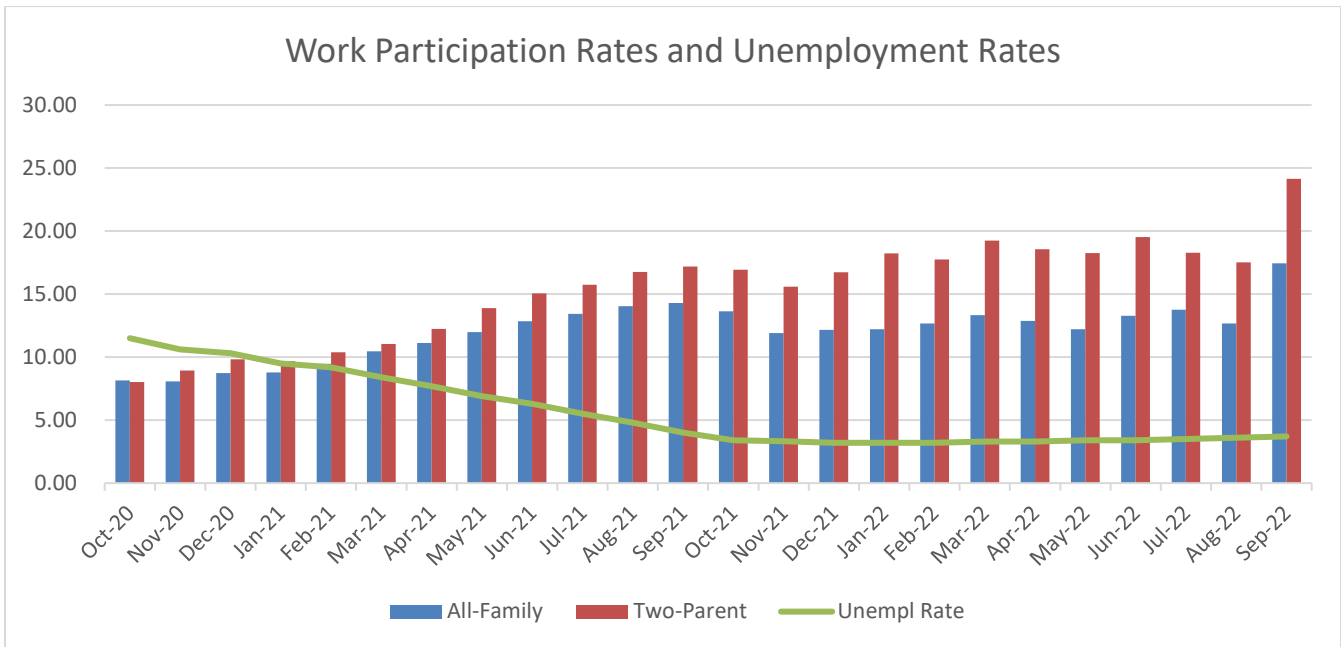
*Mandatory Households Meeting Two-Parent Families Work Participation Requirements*

FFY 2022 Planned = 34%

FFY 2022 Actual = 18.4% (prior to the application of the caseload reduction credit)

FY 2023 Planned = 21% (prior to the application of the caseload reduction credit)

- c) The All-Family and Two-Parent work participation rates were at their lowest in FFY 2021. However, the work participation rates started to increase as the state’s unemployment rate declined in FFY 2022. In FFY 2022, the All-Family Rate increased by 2.23% compared to FFY 2021, and the Two-Parent Rate increased by 6.01%.



Based on the data trend, the work participation rates appear to increase as Hawaii's unemployment rate declined.

**7. Supplemental Funding**

In addition to the annual TANF Block Grant, states may be eligible to receive a portion of the TANF Contingency Fund. The TANF Contingency Fund provides funding for states to provide benefits and services to needy families during

economic downturns. A state may receive 1/12 of 20 percent of its annual block grant for each month that it qualifies as an "eligible state." If the State qualifies for the TANF Contingency Fund for the full fiscal year, such expenditures are multiplied by the State's Medicaid match rate to determine the amount that the State may keep. However, if the State is eligible for less than the full year, the match rate is reduced by the fraction of the year that the State qualified as an "eligible state." Thus, a state may receive up to 20 percent of its TANF Block Grant if eligible for an entire year.

To qualify for and expend TANF contingency funds, States must spend Maintenance of Effort (MOE) State dollars that equal 100% of the State's share of the FFY 1994 expenditures under the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and Job Opportunities and Basic Skills (JOBS) programs (i.e., pre-TANF), and meet one of two "needy state" triggers:

1. *High Unemployment Rate:* An unemployment rate for a 3-month period that is at least 6.5 percent and 100 percent of the rate for the corresponding period in either of the two preceding calendar years; or
2. *High Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) Caseloads:* A SNAP (formerly known as Food Stamps) caseload that is 10 percent over the FY 1994-1995 level (adjusted for the impact of the 1995 welfare reform law's immigrant and Food Stamp provisions on the Food Stamp caseload).

Due to the MOE State expenditure requirement and available federal TANF reserve, the Department did not apply for the FFY 2022 TANF Contingency Funds.
