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	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>2. For 2023, there was one violation so far.</li> <li>3. John reported that the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) offered training for Judges, Family Court Staff, Wardens and Administrators of juvenile detention and correctional facilities. Training was for a new law that waived juveniles can only be sent to the adult facilities if the Judge include seven factors in the court order of why the juvenile should be in an adult facility.</li> <li>4. John also mentioned an incident on Maui where a juvenile was waived and sent to the Maui Community Correctional Center. He was kept separated from the adult inmates, and within a few hours he was able to bail out of the jail. John also said that OJJDP is setting a benchmark for violations and will start to include violations starting the next federal fiscal year.</li> <li>5. John also mentions that this committee needs a Secretary/Recorder position to be filled for Sunshine Law requirements.</li> </ol>

Major Pedro (HPD) He reported that there is no new information to report except to say school just started and arrests is expected to increase in the future.</li> </ol> <p>(9:12) Sgt. Maui Police</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Reported that during the summer, Maui Police Department held two Teen Academies, which was successful.</li> <li>• Sgt Yoshizawa ask the other county police how they are providing legal counsel before questioning a minor.</li> </ul> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Major Pedro responded by saying that Honolulu police will question a juvenile only with a parent present.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Sgt Yoshizawa said their Prosecutors are saying that the juvenile needs legal counsel, and a parent is not considered legal counsel.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Major Pedro then responded that if the new law says the juvenile needs legal counsel before questioning, then the police will not interview the minor. Until they get more guidance from the Prosecutor’s Office, they will follow the procedures in place now.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Lt. Pauole said the juvenile is given his/her rights and if asks for their parents or an attorney, they stop. If the juvenile does not want the parents in the interview, the parents will leave the room. If the parents say they want an attorney, the police will stop the interview.</p>			

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	<p>Sgt. Muraoka said that it's the same on Kauai, parents should be in the interview room with the juvenile. However, with the new law, he hasn't heard anything, and may have to check with the Prosecutors or the Resource Officers to see if they have any information on this new law.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Lt. Pauole, nothing new to report. They are like other police departments with shortage of staff. Their Chief has requested another position and they are waiting for approval.</li> <li>• Sgt. Muraoka reported that Kauai is in the same situation as other police departments, with school starting they expect more arrest of juveniles. Kauai Police sent their juvenile arrest information to John and explained that officers have marked juveniles in secure custody, but they didn't have any juvenile held in secure custody.</li> </ul> <p>Over the summer, they had a Flag Football Program for juveniles with the Pal program which has ended now. Nothing else to report.</p> <p>(9:18)</p> <p>4. Hale Kipa: Phillip Humphrey reported on the numbers from both Ho'okala Program who received</p>			

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	8 youth. The Kalihi Assessment Center reported receiving 49 civil citations referrals.
